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INTRODUCTION

The aim of this third inventory is to offer an outlook of the training organized by each of the 36 IMISCOE Research Network members in 2014-2015 and of the ongoing research projects regarding international migration and ethnic studies. Data of the third inventory (June 2013, by Sonia Gsir – CEDEM) have been updated. First, it is worth to note that in the last year the following institutes have joined the IMISCOE Research Network as new members:

Moreover, on April 1st 2014 the coordination of the IMISCOE network has moved to Erasmus University. To celebrate the transfer, a minisymposium was held on March 27th on the future research agenda of IMISCOE. Amongst others Rainer Baubock, Rinus Penninx, Elizabeth Collett, Izabela Grabowska, Andreas Pott, Marco Martiniello and Pieter Bevelander shed their light on future opportunities for the network. The transfer to Erasmus University was formalised during a special Board of Directors meeting on March 28th. The new Network Office in Rotterdam will be led by Maurice Crul (director) and Peter Scholten (Associate Director). Cees Jochemsen, Warda Belabas and Karin Milovanovic will be the new network officers.

An important fact occurred in August 2014 is that IMISCOE has closed an agreement with Springer for publishing the IMISCOE Book Series and the Journal Comparative Migration Studies. This agreement allows IMISCOE to take a new step in developing its publication series, which had been first established in 2004. In more detail, among the provisions included in the agreement we here report that Springer will publish around 6 to 10 IMISCOE Books per year in Open Access as well as non-OA books, depending on the choice of the authors. IMISCOE will also continue supporting Open Access books with an IMISCOE OA-Subsidy for IMISCOE members. Furthermore, the IMISCOE Editorial Committee will maintain editorial autonomy over reviewing and accepting book manuscript, and so will the Editorial Board of the Journal CMS. All members of IMISCOE will receive full membership access to all manuscripts of (OA as well as non-OA) IMISCOE books via a pass-word protected link at the IMISCOE-website. This will make all books (except the IMISCOE text books that have been published with AUP) available for IMISCOE members. Last, Springer and IMISCOE will make a joint investment in the development of the journal CMS for the coming period, enabling the journal to maintain its Open Access publishing strategy without asking Article Processing Fees for a period of at least two years. The book agreement is effective until mid 2018; the agreement for the journal began in January 2015 for a three year period.

Among the forthcoming activities, the IMISCOE Standing Committee on Popular Art, Diversity and Cultural Policies in Post-Migration Urban Settings is organizing a seminar on “Inclusion of immigrants in the cultural policy mainstream: Identifying approaches and challenges” to be held on September 21, 2015 in Barcelona.

The Academic Coordinators of the seminar are: Marco Martiniello (CEDEM, Liège), Wiebke Sievers (ISR, Vienna), and Ricard Zapata-Barrero (GRITIM-UPF, Barcelona).

This report has been realized upon the request of the Training Committee of the IMISCOE Research Network. It is based on data collected through a questionnaire which has been sent to each director of the 36 institutes/centres IMISCOE members (See Annex). In the end, 20 questionnaires were collected, thus providing enough data to describe the current trainings programs available within the IMISCOE Research Network and giving an idea of its dynamics in terms of research. As far as the IMISCOE members who did not fill in the questionnaire are concerned, they just appear in the overview table that shows which kind of training activities member institutes implement. When not available through the questionnaire, this information has been collected through the websites of the centres, where in the best case, the information is reliable, complete and up to date; in the worst case, it is out-of-date or partial. In several cases, the information is not available in English. Some parts of the overview table are incomplete: this means that the information was not available online or not updated.

The inventory is composed of tables that provide an overview and elements of comparison. It can be read in various ways. The objective was to be as precise as possible in providing the main elements regarding training and research. In most cases, the address of a website is given. When the information was not available at all, the table cell is empty. It is important to note that the objective of the inventory was not to compare the members' activities but rather to present them together.

The inventory is divided in two parts: EDUCATION and RESEARCH. The first part presents the masters and PhD programs related to migration and ethnic studies. It also aims at offering an overview of the other trainings in migration studies targeting postgraduate students (summer or winter courses, continuing training) and prospective trainings. The second part lists the current research projects on international migration and related issues. These two parts are preceded by an overview table. This table gives, at a glance, the training offered and current research activities among the 36 IMISCOE members. The sign * beside the name (such as DEUSTO*) indicates that the information came from the questionnaire, completed by the respondents. The sign ✓ indicates that the training / activity is organized at the concerned centre, the sign ✗ indicates that it is not organized. When the space is empty, it means that no information was found to say precisely whether or not a training / activity is developed. Finally, the annexes include a list of current PhD theses on migration and ethnic issues and a copy of the questionnaire.

Although this inventory is not complete, it gives an idea of the current education and the training capacities of the IMISCOE Research Network and it provides also an updated list of current research and doctoral research. Some members offer a joint MA programme in the framework of the Erasmus Mundus Programme, such as the Master in International Migration and Social Cohesion (MISOCO). Another joint master program in Immigration Studies is offered by the CEDEM and the GRITIM. We also find several PhD Programmes as well as MA degrees and other trainings with a migration studies track. As in the last years, the great number and variety of research projects and doctoral research projects conducted in the field of migration and ethnic studies confirms the growing interest on these issues in Europe.

This report has been realized between February and May 2015 and was completed on the 15 May 2015.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Education

The inventory is divided into tables. The box below presents briefly the five tables related to training.

MASTERS IN MIGRATION STUDIES
<p>At least 8 masters in migration and ethnic studies are organized by the same number of IMISCOE institutes. They privilege a multidisciplinary approach. Some masters are professionally oriented with policy or project design and immigration management, others are more specialized in research focusing on in-depth analysis, qualitative and quantitative methodology and they more directly prepare students to a research career. Most masters are organized in English and some offer the possibility to also chose another language, depending on the location of the studies. About the duration of the programmes, it can vary from one to two years; this is also related to a part-time or full-time engagement of the student. Among the offered programmes, an online master to sustain distance learning. The admission criteria vary but in most of the cases applicants must hold a Bachelor's degree preferably in social or political sciences, law or humanities but not exclusively. In some cases, the programme is open to other disciplines or to a previous relevant work experience.</p>
MASTERS WITH A MIGRATION STUDIES TRACK
<p>Data from the questionnaire allows us to look at 8 examples of masters with a migration and ethnic studies track organized by 4 IMISCOE institutes. There are masters in sociology, anthropology, or in other more specific domains such as International Development Aid or humanitarian rights or action and globalization with a focus on interdisciplinarity. They are organized in English or in association with another language. The duration is between one year and two years. Opportunity of outside courses is available. Applicants must hold a Bachelor's degree in social sciences and some other disciplines or 5 years professional experience.</p>
PhD PROGRAMMES
<p>At least 10 PhD programmes are available in the IMISCOE Research Network, among them some have a strong focus on migration and ethnic studies; in other cases they offer opportunities to address these subjects through PhD training such as thematic doctoral school. Joint supervision is often available. Admission criteria vary and generally applicants must hold a Master's degree.</p>
OTHER TRAININGS IN MIGRATION STUDIES
<p>At least 16 other trainings are available in 9 IMISCOE institutes. They consist of Summer or Winter schools, online courses, seminars and also of a research training programme. The format varies from a day to two weeks of intensive courses or even to a longer period (from 12 to 36 months in the case of the research training programme). Some courses target exclusively Ma or PhD students and others are open to a wider audience. Some trainings are organized in collaboration with other organizations.</p>

PLANNED TRAININGS

At least **5 institutes** have planned to organize further training such as Master programme, Summer Courses or other different training paths.

Research

Part II of the inventory lists the current research projects carried out by the 36 IMISCOE members. The focus is on research projects on migration and ethnic studies. The research of the institutes is wider in reality and in typologies, varying from doctoral research to broader programmes. The aim of this part of the inventory was not to give an exhaustive account of all the research activities carried out but rather to give an overview of the current research undertaken by each institute. In the table related to research projects, the following indications are provided: name and acronym of the project - main objectives - funding body - duration in years of the project - name of the person responsible of following the project in the institute (supervisor) - email address of a contact person or/and address of the website of the project. Around 215 research projects have been carried on or launched during the academic year 2014-2015. Some of them - in particular European projects - involved several members of the IMISCOE Research Network.

The annexes also contain a list of current PhD students by institutions. The title of the thesis, the discipline concerned, the supervisor, the current year of the research and the funding body involved are listed. There are around 240 PhD theses ongoing in the IMISCOE Research Network during the academic year 2014-2015.

Title	Double deegree in immigration Studies
General and specific objectives	<p>This new Master programme provides students with a unique opportunity to combine political science and sociology approaches to immigration studies into a double degree. Students will graduate with a Master Degree in Sociology from the University of Liège and a Master Degree in Immigration Management from the Universitat Pompeu Fabra in Barcelona. They will spend a year in each University so that they will get a chance to observe migration and diversity dynamics in two different diverse urban contexts. The programme combines theoretical insights with practical tools and is taught by renown experts and practitioners, in an inter-disciplinary perspective. It includes courses related to the politics, economics, law and sociology of migration.</p> <p>The programme seeks to train:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Migration experts in NGOs, foundations, development banks and agencies, and other not-for-profit organisations; ▪ Junior professional officers for international institutions such as the International Organisation for Migration (IOM), the UN High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) or the International Labor Office (ILO); ▪ Migration and diversity managers for government, development agencies and local authorities; ▪ Researchers for academic institutions, think-tanks and NGOs; ▪ Specialised journalists and diplomats. <p>Students have the opportunity to follow a bilingual program (French-English) or a full English program. Students wishing to do a Bilingual program (French-English) in Immigration Studies register with the University of Liège for the first year and follow classes mostly in French. They then do their second year fully in English in Barcelona. Students wishing to do a full English program register with Pompeu Fabra University for the first year and do their second year in English at the University of Liège (more details on the full English program here)</p> <p>The Master Thesis will be written under supervision of UPF Barcelona or ULg. The second reader will automatically be someone at the other institution.</p> <p>The Master Thesis will be defended and qualified by the home university of the student during the second year of the double master program. The counterpart university will recognise the ECTS and the qualification obtained by the student.</p> <p>Liège values the Master Thesis of 18 ECTS whereas UPF Barcelone values the Master Thesis</p>

	of 21 ECTS. In order to recognise the Master Thesis qualified in Liège (18 ECTS) at UPF barcelona (21 ECTS), Liège double degree students must follow an extra research work credited of 3 ECTS and delivered by UPF Barcelona.

General and specific objectives	To educate students and to create a dialogue among students, professionals and policy makers who will understand advanced theories, techniques, and methodologies in the field of Migration Studies. They will be able to translate perceived societal problems into relevant social scientific research questions and to contribute to the solution of such problems by combining insights from fundamental social theory joined with substantive theories. Admission criteria	Academic bachelor's degree (or equivalent) in social sciences discipline closely related to the programme (sociology, social/cultural anthropology, political science, and (human) geography). private care workers in the households of the elderly and the repercussion of the access to the labour market of women. Secondly, we will study the extension and diversity of the different types of attention offered in the private market, particularly developed around domestic work sector through the hiring of female domestic workers as care workers, since this is the main option for families to provide this care. Thirdly, we will estimate the capacity of the regional markets to extend the job offers linked to the care activities in the households.

Indeed, channelling efforts towards the accumulation of a certain type of (physical) capital may mean a step backwards in other capital (of a human or social nature) and vice

versa. Furthermore, they may not lead to similar social mobility trajectories for all members of the family. The theoretical approach adopted for the purpose of our study lies within the framework of literature on gender, migration and transnationalism and social mobility, as well as on research on second generations. We will apply a comparative methodology based on the triangulation of both data production techniques (namely, documentary analysis, analysis of secondary statistical studies, in-depth interviews and family life stories) and data analysis (multivariable quantitative analysis and categories-based thematic discourse analysis).
